Competing in this year's National Japan Bowl in D.C. was an experience I'll never forget. We started off strong with a Japanese dinner on the day we arrived, which was the day prior to the start of Japan Bowl. It wasn't even a purposeful choice. Our team also did some quick reviewing in the leadup to the question rounds, which were very fun. Honestly, they made me realize how much I need to work on my listening skills. A lot of the questions were listening based, and I found myself getting lost. I've decided to try and focus on this skill, as I'm going to Japan this summer and it's so crucial for communication. We also got to learn a lot about Osaka Expo through the answer review sessions—and through a surprise visit from a special guest! One other portion of the National Japan Bowl I'd like to talk about was the cultural workshops. This year, I chose to go to the kendama and tea ceremony workshops. I was very impressed by the selection of different options Japan Bowl offered, but the moment I saw kendama I knew I had to go. The instructor taught us all sorts of moves, from the most basic cup catches to swings and juggles. My teammates and I had so much fun at this workshop. There was more technique to the game than I thought, and I ended up being much better at catching the ball at the end of the workshop than I had been at the beginning. I'm actually going to ask for a kendama for Christmas because I enjoyed the workshop so much. The tea ceremony was equally enthralling, as we got the opportunity to appreciate cool tea cups, whisk matcha, and have little treats to go along with it. It actually gave me a greater appreciation for the drink of matcha, which I've always thought was too bitter for me.

To wrap up my story, I'd like to return to our adventures around the national mall on Friday. Our hotel was only a fifteen minute walk from the capitol building, and from the capitol to the main venue it was even closer.
